We are going to print just as we break for the Christmas holidays, and

Since the start of the academic year, we have been pursuing our development plan, in particular the implementation of our new Creative Media Suite and curriculum, development of sport across all ages and disciplines, and establishment of a pastoral curriculum based on 'phases' - the 'Foundation Phase' (Year 7 & 8), the 'Gateway Phase' (Y9) and the 'Next Steps Phase (Y10 & 11). 'PERFORMING DUNESCAPES'

Rapper and MC Isaiah Dreads and hip-hop dance artist Isaac Farmer ran a series of workshops in school for some of our GCSE Performing Arts students.

'Performing Dunescapes', a project led by Activate Performing Arts for the National Trust's Dynamic Dunescapes programme, sees Isaiah and Isaac lead movement and music workshops for young people, using the sand dunes at Studland as inspiration.



The students involved met both artists to hear about their work and to discuss creative ideas, before visiting the dunes together. In a series of workshops that followed, Isaiah and Isaac worked with students to develop song-writing and dance skills, in a creative response to their visit to the dunes. At the culmination of the project, the group performed to other students, before Isaiah and Isaac took to the floor to demonstrate their own talents!





About Isaiah: Dorset-based rap artist Isaiah Dreads has been making music from the age of nine and has performed at festivals across the UK including Glastonbury, Wireless, Bestival, Lovebox and the Isle of Wight Festival. Through performing and consistent release of videos online he has become an acclaimed rapper, with over 7 million streams on Spotify this year.

About Isaac: Dancer and choreographer Isaac Farmer is a qualified Street Dance teacher and has achieved titles at International, UK and Regional level. He has danced for over 15 years with Shake Dance and has performed on Britain's Got Talent, MOVE IT Main Stage and the Breakin' Convention UK Tour, to name a few.

The wider Dynamic Dunescapes programme focuses on surveying, protecting and rejuvenating dunes across the country as healthy biodiversity hotspots.

The Swanage School is also involved with the Dynamic Dunescapes project through its Science Department, with students conducting insect and fungi surveys over a five year period to contribute to collection of data on how dunes are changing over time.

SPORTS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY



A group of aspiring sports leaders were chosen to attend the Dorset Sports Leadership Academy, held at Bryanston School. Organised by Dorset School Games, the Academy welcomed 560 young people from over 40 schools and is designed to inspire young people to lead or volunteer within their school or community. It is part of a wider leadership, coaching and volunteering programme running in Dorset which provides suitable pathways for young people to learn, enrich and extend their leadership skills and to support them through a range of opportunities. Workshops were held throughout the day and athlete mentors were in attendance to inspire and motivate. The 2022 mentors were Beth Radford, former World Rowing Champion and experienced member of the Team GB Rowing Team; Jamie Barrow, the world's fastest snowboarder; and Jenna Downing, the world's number one female inline skater and ten times British Champion.

Numbers were limited and the group comprised some of our existing Sports
Ambassadors, and others who have shown a keen interest in sport since starting at
The Swanage School. All students behaved impeccably and came back inspired to become a Sports Ambassador if not one already.
A special mention to Lydia and Isobel who participated in the dance specialism during the day and showcased their talents in the Academy's closing performance!

Watersports lessons took place throughout the Autumn Term for Years 7 & 8, led by Cumulus Outdoors. Students have been on the water in kayaks, canoes and rafts!



FOOD MASTERCLASSES





During the Autumn Term, Chef Hoare visited to showcase fish preparation skills, to be followed by masterclasses in meat preparation and pasta making.

Students learnt how to de-bone and fillet various fish and how to create a delicious fish dish using locally grown and seasonal produce.

In one of the dishes, fillets were pan-fried and served with a crab meat sauce and a fennel salad. The end result, tasted by students (and staff!) was truly delicious!

OUT AND ABOUT

ON THE DUNES: Year I I Geographers have been out in the field undertaking an enquiry into the impacts of physical processes and human activity at Studland. They investigated the beach profiles by using specialist equipment to measure the angles along the beach. They also carried out sand dune transects, collecting primary data to be interpreted and analysed back at school.



Our young Scientists have also visitied Studland to conduct surveys and collect data for the National Trust's Dynamic Dunescapes project.



TO THE CATHEDRAL: GCSE Art students visited Salisbury Cathedral to experience the architecture, artefacts and an exhibition of large scale tapestries by the artist Grayson Perry. The trip enabled them to see, experience and record art, artefacts and architecture in 'real life'. Many students also visited the Cathedral's Magna Carta, one of only four surviving original documents from 1215.

Oh no they didn't! OH YES THEY DID! GCSE Drama students had a day out at the panto, watching Cinderella at The Lighthouse, Poole.



ON THE PIER: Art GCSE students visited Swanage Pier for the unveiling of their marine-

themed stone carvings, which have been installed on plinths along the length of the pier. The carvings, which were created at the Burngate Stone Carving Centre in a project spanning



several months, are for visitors to use as art rubbings. Members of the Allsort'd group joined students and Mrs Saganic for the occasion and were the first to take rubbings from the stones. During the project students learnt about the historical and cultural importance of the Pier and of stonequarrying to the local area. AUTUMN IN PARIS!

In October, some of our French GCSE students set off with Madame Fawke and Monsieur Forster for a cultural trip to Paris. During a jam-packed few days, they visited key cultural sites, took a river boat cruise on the Seine and absorbed the sights and sounds of this beautiful city.

The group explored the Montmartre area, where they discussed the new 'Mur des je t'aime' (the 'I love you' wall) and visited the impressive Sacre Coeur Basilica, enjoying the amazing views of the city from its famous steps. They shopped for local art and fashion accessories in the 'Place du Tertre' and watched the many artists at work. They discovered Notre Dame, the beautiful Arc de Triomphe and walked along the



Lafayette' with its exquisite glass dome and amazing roof top view.

They visited **The Louvre** to see famous art pieces such as the Mona Lisa and The Venus of Milo, and lunched by the ponds in **The Tuileries Gardens**. From the 56th floor of the **Montparnasse Tower** they gained incredible views of Paris.

On their final day, the group went 20m below ground and meandered through the **catacombs** tunnels, full of history and atmosphere, and challenged themselves to translate the many death related quotes along the way!



CHALLENGE WEEK

As our last issue of Making Waves went to print, students were setting off on Challenge Week trips. Each student had selected a Challenge, involving a residential trip or themed local activities, for the last week of the Summer Term. The heatwave experienced during that week and the national weather warnings in place meant that some alterations had to be made, including postponing of the London trip until September.





Some students enjoyed a **Climbing Challenge**, testing their stamina at indoor climbing walls and at Dancing Ledge. Another group threw themselves into learning to **skateboard** with visits to three different skateparks.



The **Sports & Fitness Challenge** saw students hone their skills at the Football Lab in Poole, as well as having gym and training sessions.







The rescheduled **London** trip took place just days after the death of Queen Elizabeth. The group laid flowers on behalf of the school before visiting Leicester Square and Covent Garden. A theatre visit to see Grease was the highlight.

Good schools favour continual improvement and constantly evolve. It is a key element for success and creates an environment in which the highest possible educational standards and best possible student experience of school can be met. Good schools also look after their staff, meet their statutory requirements and manage tight financial resources well. Good school leadership needs self-evaluation, monitoring, reviewing and constructive feedback, from which short, medium and longer term aims are developed. Governors play an important role in all of this.

Whilst governors do not manage the day-to-day running of the school, they have oversight and hold school leaders to account. They are, in effect, a 'critical friend' to school leaders, providing challenge and analysis, as well as support.

Working with the community and volunteers makes The Swanage School a special place and creates fantastic opportunities for our students.


Whether it is to give a talk in assembly, help run a club or lend a hand in the garden, input from volunteers has been incredibly valuable.

YEAR 7 DESIGN SHOWCASE


